**Introduction:**

This report will provide a synopsis of activities and programs for first six months of 2009 toward the VicPD *Strategic Plan Goal 3 – Reduce Property Crime*. Four performance indicators are used to quantify the progress toward this goal. While the majority of performance measures listed below are assigned to Crime Prevention Services Managers, there is a continuing commitment by all VicPD Staff and Volunteers who contribute to the success of the VicPD Strategic Plan and Goals.

## 1. Reported Crime Rate for Property Crime:

The following table provides a comparative analysis of Property Crime Offences for the first six months of 2009 with comparison to 2008. **Overall, Property Crimes decreased 11.5% or the first six months of 2009, with substantial decrease of 50% of total Break and Enters.**

## 2. Block Watch:

The VicPD Blockwatch program continues to grow in both communities of Victoria and Esquimalt. In March of 2009, Blockwatch members participated in the VicPD Blockwatch Blitz, this campaign focused on expansion of the program with existing Blockwatch members conducting a door to door canvass to neighboring streets to provide information on the program to encourage homeowners to consider forming new Blockwatch groups. The campaign resulted in 11 new blocks registering for the program, an increase of 6.1% from last year. **As of August 2009 there are 3,706 homes participating in Blockwatch, an increase of 7.3% from 2008.**

The success of the Blockwatch Program has been evidenced by several anecdotal incidents where Blockwatch members have observed suspicious activity in their neighborhood and called police resulting in the arrest of property crime offenders. The Blockwatch program is managed by a full time paid coordinator, Ms. Beverley Stewart, who works closely with the 270 volunteer Blockwatch Captains and Co-Captains.

### 3. Crime Free Multi-Housing:

Since the start-up of the Crime Free Multi-Housing Program (CFMH) in October of 2006, the program has continued to grow, providing Rental Property Owners, Managers and Tenants with safe and enjoyable residential communities, along with reduced attendance by police for nuisance calls for service. The VicPD CFMH Program is managed by Constable Derek Tolmie who works closely with Mr. Al Kemp, CEO of Rental Owner Managers Society of BC (ROMS BC) to provide training for building owners and managers wishing to participate in the program.

As of June 2009, there are a total of 124 CFMH buildings (100 in Victoria, 24 in Esquimalt) participating in the program. The three phase process for CFMH Certification consists of Manager's Training Workshop, Safety-Security Audit of the Building and a Tenant Safety Meeting. To date, 64 of the participating CFMH buildings have received full certification. The VicPD CFMH Program will continue to hold two Manager/Owner recruiting-training workshops annually (Spring and Fall), for intake of new CFMH Buildings- Managers.

***From 2008 to 2009 there was a 13.4% reduction in calls for service to buildings participating in the VicPD CFMH Program. Since the inception of the CFMH program in 2006, there has been an overall decrease of 38.6% in calls for service to buildings participating in the CFMH program.***

### 4. Volunteers and Reserves:

The VicPD Volunteer and Reserve Programs continues to play a vital role in supporting VicPD in implementing projects/programs aimed at reducing crime with a specific emphasis on property and retail theft. VicPD Volunteers continue to represent the department in a variety of roles, as indicated on the following chart. The chart also shows that the volunteer roster has fluctuated within categories, but remains fixed at 82 volunteers.

**Collectively, volunteers have provided over 3,500 hours of services so far in 2009 and, shown on the chart below, this represents an increase of 5% over 2008. This increase surpasses the performance measurement goal to increase by 2% in 2009.**

The first six months of 2009 has been a time of transition with the appointment of a new Coordinator of Volunteer Services, Ms. Karen Wallis, at the end of January 2009. Karen has spent time reviewing processes, policies and procedures. She is presently developing new recruitment and screening practices to be implemented this Fall and is launching a volunteer survey to collect volunteer program data and evaluate volunteer satisfaction.

In addition to regular deployments, Crime Watch volunteers have been involved in several projects, community events, and distribution of police/program information. Front Desk Volunteers have continued to represent the department in their important role of greeting the public, processing criminal record checks and managing general enquiries.

The 40 member VicPD Reserve Constable Program continues to provide a valuable Volunteer group that supports a variety of Crime Prevention Programs. In April of 2009 19 new Reserve Constables graduated from the six month training program. The VicPD Reserve Program is recognized as an excellent proving ground for police recruiting seeking full time careers in policing. Since January of 2008 10 VicPD Reserve officers have been hired as regular police officers, 8 with VicPD and 2 with the RCMP.

Since January 2009, VicPD Reserves have logged in excess of 2400 volunteer hours supporting a number of CPS programs that include: Blockwatch Orientation Presentations, Personal Safety Lectures, Home-Business Security Audits, Lock-Out Auto Crime Patrols and ride-along with front line Patrol and Focused Enforcement Team members.
