**Message/Executive Summary from the Chair**

The year 2003-04 has been one of fruitful activity for the Crime Prevention Committee, undertaken both in lively and interactive meetings and in parallel work undertaken by individual Committee members on behalf of the CACP. The Committee membership has been dynamic, with both departures and new members. The level of commitment has been impressive. New members have become quickly oriented to the planned work of the Committee. As a result, the group was able to retain its focus on the ambitious work plan developed in 2002-03, while remaining flexible in dealing with specific issues that arose during the year. The Committee was able to complete a set of learning materials designed to stimulate community discussions and action planning on crime prevention through social development; these are available from the CACP to all police and to their community partners and will be put to use in the coming year.

The Committee acknowledges with thanks the support of its advisors and the Government of Canada through the National Crime Prevention Strategy, as well as the collaboration of the other national associations with whom the Committee has worked in the past twelve months.

- January 31-February 1, 2004 – Toronto, Ontario

Updates were provided by the Chair on activities of the Committee since the previous meeting on August 24, 2003; by Chief Edgar MacLeod on the Coalition proposal; by the CACP Executive Director; by D/Chief Gary Crowell on the working partnership with Family Service Canada; and by federal advisors. The Committee heard presentations from representatives of the San Romanoway Revitalization Association initiative, the Canadian Council on Social Development, and Toronto Police on their youth strategy. Members considered a request to support the Canadian Joint Statement on the Physical Punishment of Children. The meeting focused on implementation of the Committee work plan.

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
