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CACP Private Sector Liaison Committee **2005/2006 Year End Report**

Introduction

This report has been created to provide a general overview of the CACP Private Sector Liaison Committee (PSLC) activities from the CACP 2005 Annual Conference to date. The committee has aggressively sought to enhance the collaborative efforts between the private sector and policing, on a national level. Meetings took place in February (Calgary), May (Montreal) and August (St. Johns) this year. In the coming year meetings are scheduled for November (Montreal), March (Vancouver) and August (Calgary).

Committee Makeup

The PSLC currently has 36 members with the vast majority of same representing the private sector. At its August meeting the PSLC committed to a significant expansion of its police membership. Efforts will be made to obtain a more diverse national representation.

During the year PSLC Chair, Deputy Chief Rod Piukkala, retired from the Durham Regional Police Service and he resigned his position on the committee. His leadership and his contributions to PSLC were significant. The Committee wishes to thank Rod for his outstanding contributions to the PSLC activities.

Following the resignation of Rod Piukkala, Chief Serge Meloche (CN Police) and Chief Brian Mullan (Hamilton Police Service) were appointed as Co-Chairs for the Committee.

Committee Activity

The following information is a brief summary of the PSLC activities during the last year.

1. **National Mass Marketing Fraud Strategy**
As a result of a detailed review of the current status of mass marketing fraud in Canada, the PSLC developed a national strategy to address the ongoing situation. The strategy was placed before the CACP Membership during the 2006 Conference in St. Johns Nfld and it was endorsed.
2. **Private Security / Security Legislation**
During the year PSLC began to examine the current and proposed Private and Security Legislation on a national level. The examination is focused on the possible need to have consistent and standardized legislation across the country. This detailed examination will take much more time to complete.

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
