## CONCLUSION

The crime statistics for the month of July 2012 reflect a decrease in Crimes Against the Person of (-12.9%) compared to July 2011, while Crimes Against Property show a (-5.9%) decrease compared to July 2011. Crimes Against the Person and Crimes Against Property show a combined year-to-date reduction of (-7.4%)

## **BACKGROUND**

Each month, reports providing statistics for the City of Regina are presented to the Board for their review and information. This report will provide statistics for the month of July 2012. The Communications Centre statistics are included showing the total calls for service.

## **DISCUSSION**

Crimes Against Property reflect a decrease of (-387) reported incidents over 2011, for an overall year-to-date decrease of (-5.9%) We have seen a decrease of (-421) reported incidents of theft under \$5000 for a (-13.7%) decrease. There are 23 fewer reported incidents of Mischief / Wilful Damage for a (-1.5%) decrease. Over the past 15 months the Regina Police is noticing the emerging trend of an increase in reported incidents of Crime Against Property and applying crime prevention and enforcement measures where appropriate.

Thefts of Auto rates show an increase of 21.6 % in our year to date statistics. The Regina Police Service in conjunction with its partners in the Stolen Auto Strategy continues to pay constant attention to this issue.

Crimes Against the Person reflect a year to date decrease of (-236) fewer incidents over July 2011, for a (-12.9%) decrease. There were 26 reported robberies in July for a year to date decrease of (-30) incidents or a reduction of (-16.0%).

Overall the Regina Police Service has received (-623) fewer reported incidents of Crimes Against the Person and Crimes Against Property combined in 2012 over 2011 incidents for a (-7.4%) decrease.

Total dispatched calls for service decreased by (-2.1%); with a reduction in alarm calls of (-19.2%).

## CONCLUSION

Regina's total reported crime at mid-year 2012 was at its lowest point in the past ten years. Both Crimes Against the Person and Crimes Against Property were also ten-year lows. Crime types that were ten-year lows included: Assault, Sexual Assault, Robbery, Theft, and Mischief.


## **BACKGROUND**

Twice each year, once at mid-year and once at year-end, the Regina Police Service provides an analysis of police-reported crime in Regina over the previous ten-year period. This report compares data compiled from January 1 to June 30 for the period of 2003 through 2012.

Measuring crime statistics<sup>1</sup> and their changes over time is effective for identifying trends. The Regina Police Service gathers data in the same manner each year, allowing for reliable analyses of crime within the city over time.


## **DISCUSSION**

There were 9.5% fewer reported Total Crimes<sup>2</sup> than at mid-year 2011 and 37.2% fewer than at mid-year 2003.



These statistics are not intended for comparison with other jurisdictions that may use different methodologies or have different reporting criteria. <sup>2</sup> Included in Total Crime are Crimes Against the Person, Crimes Against Property, Criminal Code traffic violations, the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act, and those reports generated by the Regina Police Service in relation to procedural and other enforcement-related categories (Other Criminal Code violations). The data was pulled for this report on July 9<sup>th</sup>, 2012.

There were 12.2% fewer reported Crimes Against the Person than at mid-year 2011 and 21.4% fewer than at mid-year 2003.




The two Homicides at mid-year 2012 were fewer than the mean average for the mid-point of the previous ten years ( $\bar{x} = 3.3$ ). The two Attempted Murders were also fewer than the ten-year mean average ( $\bar{x} = 4.8$ ).




<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>3</sup> Since Regina has relatively few homicides or attempted murders in any given year, a slight change in the count would be represented by a dramatic percentage change that would only exaggerate the difference. Percentage changes will therefore not be utilized in this report when discussing crime types with relatively low counts. Instead, comparisons to the ten-year mean average ( $\overline{X}$ ) will be utilized when appropriate.

The total Assaults reported at mid-year 2012 were a ten-year low, with 6.4% fewer than at mid-year 2011 and 8.1% fewer than at mid-year 2003. Still, Assaults were fairly stable over this period, with relatively mild deviation in any given year from the ten-year mean average ( $\bar{x} = 1,086.2$ ; standard deviation = 51.1). Almost two-thirds of the total Assaults in the first half of 2012 were Common Assaults, with Assaults with a Weapon or Causing Bodily Harm, Aggravated Assaults, and Other Assaults making up the remaining third.




The fifty-five Sexual Assaults at mid-year 2012 were a ten-year low, well below the ten-year average ( $\bar{x} = 70.1$ ). The eight Other Sex Crimes<sup>4</sup> was comparable to the ten-year mean average ( $\bar{x} = 7.8$ ).





Robbery at mid-year 2012 was a ten-year low, with 21.0% fewer reported than at mid-year 2011 and 45.1% fewer than at mid-year 2003. The number of Robberies fluctuated annually, with no sustained year-to-year increases or decreases lasting more than two consecutive years. Developing a comprehensive strategy to reduce street robbery is an initiative in the Regina Police Service Strategic Plan, 2011-2014.




The six reported occurrences of Kidnapping / Forcible Confinement at mid-year 2012 was about half the ten-year mean average ( $\bar{x} = 12.9$ ).

The twelve reported Criminal Harassment / Stalking occurrences at mid-year 2012 were fewer than the ten-year mean average ( $\bar{x} = 16.7$ ).




## Crimes Against Property


There were 5.3% fewer reported Crimes Against Property than at mid-year 2011 and 47.6% fewer than at mid-year 2003.




Following three consecutive years of reductions, there were 17.4% more Motor Vehicles Thefts than at mid-year 2011 but still 63.1% fewer than at mid-year 2003.



Theft<sup>5</sup> comprises almost one-quarter of Total Crime in Regina. There were 11.9% fewer reported Thefts than at mid-year 2011 and 45.0% fewer than at mid-year 2003. Less than 2% of Thefts involved property valued at more than \$5,000.




There were 8.2% more reported Break and Enters than at mid-year 2011 but 59.0% fewer than at mid-year 2003. A reduction strategy, modeled after the Regina Auto Theft Strategy, was implemented following the increase in Break and Enters from 2006 to 2007. Preventative measures taken by Reginans, such as home security systems, may also partly explain the tenyear reduction.




The number of Mischief / Willful Damage at mid-year 2012 was a ten-year low, with 1.1% fewer reported than at mid-year 2011 and 29.6% fewer than at mid-year 2003. The City of Regina and the Regina Police Service encourage public reporting of graffiti, a form of Mischief. The Regina Police Service also implemented a Graffiti Coordinator position in 2011 to increase investigative capacity. Of the reported Mischief by mid-year 2012, 12.8% were recorded as being occurrences of graffiti.




The twenty-nine reported Arson incidents at mid-year 2012 was lower than the ten-year mean average ( $\bar{x} = 32.3$ ).



There were 21.2% fewer Other Criminal Code violations<sup>6</sup> than at mid-year 2011 and 2.5% fewer than at mid-year 2003. Some reports falling under Other Criminal Code violations – such as procedural (or administration of justice) offences and prostitution charges – are partially generated through police initiatives and projects.




There were 22.7% fewer Procedural Offences than at mid-year 2011 but 18.1% more than at mid-year 2003. Procedural Offences make up a large portion of Other Criminal Code violations. Breach of Probation, Fail to Attend Court, and Bail Violations combined to account for 87.0% of all Other Criminal Code violations in the first half of 2012. The increase in Procedural Offences over the decade can partly be explained by the usage of curfew checks on select offenders as part of the strategies to reduce Motor Vehicle Thefts and Break and Enters.





The fifty-eight occurrences of Prostitution at mid-year 2012 were comparable to the ten-year mean average ( $\bar{x} = 58.7$ ).




Controlled Drugs & Substances Act (CDSA) and Traffic Violations


There were 11.0% fewer CDSA occurrences than at mid-year 2011 but 81.8% more than at mid-year 2003. The increase in CDSA occurrences from 2004 to 2005 was related to the creation of a Special Enforcement Team (SET) and, shortly after, the Combined Forces Special Enforcement Unit (CFSEU), as well as organizational restructuring in the Regina Police Service's Criminal Investigation Division (CID).



Traffic Violations, including offences from both the Criminal Code and the provincial Highway Traffic Act, decreased by 18.0% compared to mid-year 2011 but has increased by 25.7% compared to mid-year 2003. The number of Traffic Violations is partially generated through traffic initiatives and projects. Report Impaired Drivers (RID) and Enforcement Overdrive are two examples of collaborative programs that address impaired driving.



There were 0.6% more traffic tickets issued<sup>7</sup> than at mid-year 2011 and 55.6% more than at mid-year 2003.





## Calls for Service

There were 1.6% fewer Calls for Service than at mid-year 2011 and 5.1% fewer than at mid-year 2003. Total Call for Service have been fairly consistent over the ten-year period ( $\bar{x} = 30,378.8$ ; standard deviation = 845.8).

There were 19.9% fewer Alarm calls than at mid-year 2011 and 40.1% fewer than the peak year of 2005, after which legislation regarding responsible alarm use was brought into force.



## **SUMMARY**

Despite the expansion and population growth that Regina has experienced in recent years, Total Crime in the city continues to decrease. Both Crimes Against the Person and Crimes Against Property at mid-year 2012 were at ten-year lows. There were also fewer Other Criminal Code Violations, offences under the Controlled Drugs & Substances Act, and Traffic Offences compared to mid-year 2011.

I would like to thank the Regina Police Service for their recent support of Camp fYrefly where I was resident Psychologist/Counsellor. In particular I wish to thank Corporal Tracey Dunnigan of the Community and Cultural Diversity Unit for her outstanding contribution.

The support provided by Cpl. Dunnigan was essential to the overall success of Camp and was a valuable bridge building exercise between a variety of communities and all police agencies including the Regina Police Service. Our camp was populated entirely by youth at risk of exploitation, abuse, addictions, suicide, and being victims of crime. Our campers were gay, lesbian, bisexual, two-spirited and transgender youth who have experienced difficulties in their home communities, including Regina. About a third of our campers were Aboriginal youth living on and off reserve. Members of the LGBTTQ and Aboriginal communities continue to have fears of police involvement in their lives due to historical persecutions and biases from police agencies that predate your tenure as Chief.

Corporal Dunnigan's assistance in coordinating transportation for campers using Regina Police Service officers and vehicles allowed campers to interact with police officers in a relaxed and informal manner. Her presence at camp, in uniform, was for many of our campers the first ever positive interaction they have had with police agencies. Her presentation on homophobia, transphobia, and hate crimes was very well received by campers and touched many of them deeply. She was also able to educate campers about the difficulties faced by the police when dealing with hate crimes. Cpl. Dunnigan ate with campers to learn from their experiences which I am confident will help her in duties with the Community and Cultural Diversity Unit to enhance community policing in our city.

When Cpl. Dunnigan was not at camp, campers were asking where she was and when they would be able to see her again. This is a great testament to her efforts and success at building understanding between the police and marginalized communities. As a Registered Psychologist I know that this mutual understanding is the essential first step to building trust.
