Re: The False Alarm Bylaw

RECOMMENDATION

Receive and file.

CONCLUSION

The joint effort by the Alarm Co-ordinator and alarm industry in the education of alarm users remains the best approach to reducing false alarms. The Alarm Co-ordinator's contact with new alarm users, the distribution of alarm brochures and the utilization of media, such as the Regina Police Service website, assists with alarm awareness and is assisting with the prevention of false alarms.

From 2011 to 2012, there was a 1.3% increase in the number of permits. Alarm calls account for 10.7% of the total calls for service which is 1.2% lower than 2011. The percentage of false alarms remains the same as last year – 98.6% of the total alarm calls for service were false. In 2012, 50.3% of all alarm calls were cancelled which is slightly lower than 2011. Lastly, there were nine more billable events in 2012 than in 2011. There has been an average of 679 billable events per year between 2008 and 2012.

BACKGROUND

The False Alarm Bylaw was passed by City Council on March 8, 2004, and implemented June 1, 2004.

The False Alarm Bylaw contains a mandatory registration clause for alarmed premises, a financial penalty for the third and fourth false alarm, and a suspension of police response. A caution notice is served after a premise has two false alarms and a \$75 penalty is assessed after the third and fourth alarm. The fourth alarm within a 365-day period also causes a suspension of police response to subsequent alarms; however, police are always dispatched to panic or distress alarms and incidents involving criminal activity.

DISCUSSION

False Alarm Bylaw information is available on the Regina Police Service website. The *Crime Prevention Tips* section provides Bylaw details, the impact of false alarms on the Police Service, and access to the alarm site registration. The site also provides a link to e-mail questions or comments to the Alarm Co-ordinator.

At the end of 2012 there were 28,297 registered permits in the City of Regina. In 2012 there were 3,458 alarm permit applications received which represent an average of nine per day.

In 2012, new alarm sites increased by 1.3% over 2011.¹ This number is lower than reported new sites in 2011. Permits for 3,458 alarm sites were issued; however, only 357 were for new alarm sites. The remaining 3,101 represent new permit numbers assigned to existing alarm sites because of a change in ownership or monitoring company.

In 2012, there were 6,621 alarm calls for service in Regina. Of the total alarm calls for service in 2012, 6,527 were false alarms compared to 7,444 false alarms in 2011. In 2012, 98.6% of alarm calls for service were false alarms.

Cancelled dispatch request statistics have been collected since 2006. A dispatch request call for service is cancelled by the alarm company when they determine police are not required. Of all dispatch requests received in 2012, 50.3% were cancelled. The number of cancelled dispatch requests remains constant.

RECOMMENDATION

CONCLUSION

The crime statistics for the month of February 2013 reflect a decrease in Crimes Against the Person of (-13.4%) compared to February 2012, while Crimes Against Property show a (-20.7%) decrease compared to February 2012. Crimes Against the Person and Crimes Against property show a combined year-to-date reduction of (-19.1%)

BACKGROUND

Each month, reports providing statistics for the City of Regina are presented to the Board for their review and information. This report will provide statistics for the month of February 2012. The Communications Centre statistics are included showing the total calls for service.

DISCUSSION

Crimes Against Property reflect a decrease of (-302) reported incidents over 2012, for an overall year-to-date decrease of (-20.7%). We have seen a decrease of (-60) reported incidents of Theft Under \$5000 for a (-9.5%) decrease. There are (-94) fewer reported incidents of Mischief / Wilful Damage for a (-27.3%) decrease.

Thefts of Auto rates have decreased by (-41) incidents for an overall decrease of (-32.0%) in our year-to-date statistics. The Regina Police Service in conjunction with its partners in the Stolen Auto Strategy continues to pay constant attention to this issue.

Crimes Against the Person reflect a year-to-date decrease of (-54) fewer incidents over February 2013 for a (-13.4%) decrease. There were 10 reported Robberies in February for a year-to-date increase of 1 incident or an increase of 3.7%.

Overall the Regina Police Service has received (-356) fewer reported incidents of Crimes Against the Person and Crimes Against Property combined in 2013 over 2012 incidents for a (-19.1%) decrease.

There were a total of 4137 dispatched calls for service in February for a year-to-date reduction of (-0.7%) and alarm calls for service show a year-to-date increase of 3.2%.


