





Rodney King. biography

Born in Sacramento, California on April 9, 1965, Rodney King was caught by the Los Angeles police after a high-speed chase on March 3, 1991. The officers pulled him out of the car and beat him brutally, while amateur cameraman George Holliday caught it all on videotape. The four LAPD officers involved were indicted on charges of assault with a deadly weapon and excessive use of force by a police officer. However, after a three-month trial, a predominantly white jury acquitted the officers, inflaming citizens and sparking the violent 1992 Los Angeles riots. Two decades after the riots, King told CNN that he had forgiven the officers. King was found dead in his swimming pool on June 17, 2012, in Rialto, California, at the age of 47.

Every Wednesday, while his family watches *Dallas* on IV, Toronto police Sgt. Tim Burrows opens his laptop and begins a conversation with the public via an online orum called #copchat.

The first "pure police chat" anywhere, as Burrows describes it, #copchat gets neither official backing nor interference. It's Burrows' one-man campaign to get cops and citizens talking to each other about issues that affect both.


