




New York Street and Sherman Drive Overview

- New York St / N Sherman Dr is an urban neighborhood (based on population density) located in Indianapolis, Indiana.
- Primarily made up of small (studio to two bedroom) to medium sized (three or four bedroom) single-family homes and townhomes. Many of the residences in the neighborhood are relatively historic, built no later than 1939, and in some cases, quite a bit earlier. A number of residences were also built between 1940 and 1969.
- Median real estate prices are \$46,493, which is less expensive than 97% of Indiana neighborhoods.
- Average rental prices in are currently \$533, based on neighborhood analysis.
 - Rentals here are currently lower in price then 61.3% of Indiana neighborhoods.






New York Street and Sherman Drive Marital Status Overview




New York Street and Sherman Drive Education Overview







New York Street and Sherman Drive School Expulsions








New York Street and Sherman Drive Expulsion Grade Level






New York Street and Sherman Drive Juvenile Crime Breakdown







Action Plan

- Create topic-specific Community Engagement Teams
 - Mental illness
 - Vacant housing
 - Youth activities
 - Engagement center
- Host focus-area community conversations to initiate engagement and assess needs
- Community to help decide goals/objectives and needed Community Engagement Teams for DPS



- Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department
 - Reduce violent crime in focus areas by 5 percent (criminal homicide, rape, non-fatal shootings, robbery).
 - Decrease citizen perception or fear of crime by 20 percent.
 - Increase property crime arrests in focus areas by 2 percent with the goal of reducing property crime (burglary, graffiti, vandalism).
 - Documented increase in juvenile participation in Community Affairs Programs.
 - Documented increase in the incoming amount of community tips and crime information.





- Indianapolis Fire Department
 - Reduce number of structure fires in focus areas by 5 percent.
 - Increase juvenile arson completed interventions to 75 percent of contacts.
 - Complete 90 percent of building inspections in focus areas within six months.
 - Provide first response in four minutes and full company in eight minutes in focus areas (90% or greater achievement).





- Indianapolis Emergency Medical Services
 - Provide transport ambulance response times under 10 minutes in focus areas (90% or greater achievement)
 - Documented reduction in the number of overdose deaths in focus areas.
 - Documented improvement in the patient ratio of shootings to homicide.
 - Reduce IEMS mental/emotional calls in focus areas by 10 percent.
 - Documented reduction in non-emergent use of EMS system in focus areas.





- Division of Homeland Security
 - Coordinate All Intelligence with the Focus Areas
 - Coordinate with Federal Agencies on Enforcement Actions
 - Establish a data analysis unit in conjunction with MESH.
 - Coordinate and track all focus area initiatives and activities.
 - Work with Code for America on more effective ways to view and share open data
 - Host focus area meetings with partners and community.





- Indianapolis Animal Care and Control
 - Hold a micro-chipping event in each of the focus areas with the goal of providing free dog micro-chipping.
 - ACC will work with the Indianapolis Animal Welfare Alliance (IAWA) groups to create and distribute a holistic set of handouts, brochures, informational packets and resource listings in a one-day blitz in each of the focus areas.
 - ACC will coordinate the various local enforcement agencies including DCE, IMPD, Marion County Health Department and others to combat dog-fighting incidents in the focus areas.





Public Safety Communications

- Determine three year monthly history for calls to 911 (emergency), 3811 (non-emergency), and 211 (service providers).
- Show monthly decrease in 911 calls by shifting calls to 3811 and 211.





Citizens Police Complaint Office

- Identify number of complaints received in focus areas and create contact response card with goal of no re-occurrence.
- Identify complaint patterns that might exist for district training follow-up.
- Have a CPCO staff member attend all focus area community engagement meetings.

- Mayor's Office of Re-Entry
 - Identify 100 individuals who are most at-risk to re-offend in the six focus areas and engage them with wrap-around services.
 - Establish six qualified/certified resource centers to serve the focus areas.




Focus Area Map
