## Preface

The National Justice Statistics Initiative (NJSI) is a federal – provincial – territorial partnership for the collection of information on the nature and extent of crime and the administration of civil and criminal justice in Canada. The mandate of the NJSI is to provide this information to the justice community and to the public. The Canadian Centre for Justice Statistics, created in 1981 as a division of Statistics Canada, is the operational arm of the NJSI.

This *Canadian Crime Statistics* publication was prepared by Daniel Léonard and Monique Poulin, Policing Services Program, Canadian Centre for Justice Statistics.

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## CHAPTER 1

### Crime statistics in Canada

#### 1.1 Introduction

This publication provides a statistical summary of police-reported crime in Canada and the provinces/territories back to 1962. The data presented in this publication are taken from the two Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) databases. For a summary analysis of these data, please see the Juristat entitled *Crime Statistics in Canada, 2003* which was released by Statistics Canada in July 2004 (Vol. 24, no. 6). This report provides more detailed tabulations of the databases.

Included in this publication are the following categories of tables: standard crime tables at the national and provincial/territorial levels; an historical crime table dating back to 1962; a municipal table describing crime in census metropolitan areas (CMAs) with populations over 100,000; and, a set of tables using the Incident-based UCR2 Survey to describe characteristics of criminal incidents, their victims, and the accused persons. These tables include data on weapon use, the accused-victim relationship, and the age and sex of victims and accused.

#### 1.2 Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Survey

The Canadian Centre for Justice Statistics (CCJS), in co-operation with the policing community, collects police-reported crime statistics through the UCR Survey. The UCR Survey was designed to measure the incidence of crime in Canadian society and its characteristics. The Survey classifies incidents according to the most serious offence (MSO) occurring in the incident (generally the offence which carries the longest maximum sentence under the *Criminal Code*). In categorizing incidents, violent offences always take precedence over non-violent offences. For example, an incident involving both a breaking and entering offence and an assault is counted as an incident of assault. As a result of the MSO scoring rule, less serious offences are under-counted by the UCR Survey. Currently there are two levels of detail collected by the UCR survey.

##### 1.2.1 Aggregate UCR Survey

The UCR Survey produces a continuous historical record of crime and traffic statistics reported by police agencies in Canada since 1962. UCR data reflect reported crime that has been substantiated by police. Information collected by the survey includes the number of criminal incidents, the clearance status of those incidents (whether a charge was laid or the incident was cleared otherwise) and persons-charged information. The UCR Survey is considered to be a summary or aggregate type survey, with data available for nearly 100 separate criminal offences. By the end of 2003, 97 police services, representing 39% of the national volume of crime in Canada, were still reporting to the aggregate UCR. Data for the remaining police agencies reporting to the incident-based UCR 2 Survey are converted to this aggregate format to provide full coverage of aggregate crime statistics.

##### 1.2.2 Incident-based UCR (UCR2) Survey

Extensive re-development work was initiated in 1984 in order to expand the information collected from the aggregate UCR Survey. The incident-based UCR2 Survey allows detailed examinations of accused and victim characteristics (e.g., age, sex, accused-victim relationship, level of injury and weapon causing injury), as well as characteristics of the incident itself (e.g., location, targets of violations, secondary violations, the presence of weapons, property type damaged or stolen, date and time). The survey generates a rich micro-database where incident, accused and victim variables can be analyzed. Research questions and issues that previously could only be addressed through small sample surveys or case studies can now be undertaken using data from the incident-based UCR2 Survey.

The first police respondents to report to the UCR2 Survey were the Niagara Regional Police and Fredericton Police who began reporting micro-data in 1988. By the end of 2003, 122 police services, representing 61% of the national volume of reported crime, were responding to the new Survey (see Table 3.1 for a list of Incident-based UCR Survey respondents). Coverage will continue to grow as more police agencies convert to the Incident-based UCR Survey.

### 1.3 Other crime-related surveys

#### 1.3.1 Homicide Survey

In addition to the two UCR surveys, the CCJS collects detailed information on all homicide offences in Canada through the Homicide Survey. The Homicide Survey has been the primary mechanism for the collection of national homicide statistics since 1961. It provides detailed information about each homicide occurring in Canada, as well as the characteristics of the victims and the accused.

Specific research queries regarding homicide occurrences and their circumstances are best addressed through the Homicide Survey, which offers a greater range of variables than either of the UCR surveys. Additional variables available from the homicide survey include: marital status, aboriginal origin, employment status and occupation, previous criminal convictions of victims and accused, apparent cause of death and weapon used to kill victim, alcohol consumption by accused and victim, relationship between accused and victim, time of incident, specific location of incident, precipitating crimes, drug involvement, gang involvement, and apparent motive related to the incident.

#### 1.3.2 Police Administration Survey

In operation since 1962 and revised in 1986, the Police Administration Survey collects information on police personnel and expenditures from all municipal and provincial police forces, as well as the RCMP. Personnel data are available by type of personnel (police, special constables, civilians) and by gender. Police expenditure information is available by major financial category (e.g., salaries, wages and benefits, other operating costs and total operating expenditures). Police Resources in Canada (Cat. No. 85-225-XIE) is the annual report produced from this survey.

#### 1.3.3 Victimization surveys

In addition to the police-reported UCR Survey, criminal victimization surveys are undertaken by Statistics Canada on a cyclical basis to produce estimates of the extent of unreported crime in Canada. Statistics Canada first conducted a victimization survey as part of the General Social Survey (GSS) Program in 1988. The survey was repeated in 1993 and again in 1999. The most recent version of the GSS Victimization Survey is underway in 2004 with results published in 2005. The 2004 survey samples 26,000 Canadians age 15 and over in all provinces and territories. As the GSS asks a sample of the population about their personal crime experiences, it captures information on crimes that have been reported to the police, as well as those that have gone unreported. The number of unreported crimes can be substantial. For example, the 1999 GSS estimated that 78% of sexual assaults and 67% of household thefts were not reported to the police. As a result, victimization surveys usually produce much higher rates of victimization than police-reported statistics.

Victimization surveys have limitations, however. For one, they rely on respondents to report events accurately. As well, they address only certain types of crimes. They do not capture information on crimes that have no obvious victim (e.g. prostitution and impaired driving), where the victim is a business or school, where the victim is dead (as in homicides), or where the victim is a child (anyone younger than 15 in the case of the GSS).

- The increase in Other Criminal Code offences in Montréal was driven by an 87% increase in counterfeiting currency incidents. While a large increase in the number of incidents was reported for the city of Montréal, it was likely the subject of over-reporting on behalf of increases in other areas within the province, due to the location of a number of bank data centres centralized within the city's core. It should be noted, however, that the increase in counterfeit currency within Montréal was comparable to the national increase.
- Ottawa refers to the Ontario part of the Ottawa-Gatineau CMA.
- Toronto Police implemented a new records management system in September 2003. As the transition had a short-term impact on data quality, data for September to December 2003 were estimated from 2002 data for the same period.
- Abbotsford, British Columbia and Kingston, Ontario became new CMAs as of the 2001 Census.
- Gatineau refers to the Quebec part of the Ottawa-Gatineau CMA.
- The increase in Other Criminal Code offences in Trois-Rivières were driven by a 109% increase in counterfeiting currency incidents.

#### Footnotes

1. To produce the “actual number” of incidents, unfounded incidents are subtracted from the number of reported incidents. Please refer to section 5.26 for definitions.
2. Rates are calculated on the basis of 100,000 population. The population estimates for 2003 are preliminary postcensal estimates as of July 1 and are provided by Statistics Canada’s Demography Division, Population Estimates Section. Due to rounding, figures may not add exactly to totals.
3. “Clearance rate” is the number of incidents cleared by charge and cleared otherwise in the reporting period, divided by the actual number of incidents in the reporting period, multiplied by 100. Since a criminal incident may be solved several months or years after it was first reported to the UCR Survey, it is possible for the number of incidents cleared to be greater than the total number of actual incidents. In these cases, the clearance rate will be greater than 100%. Please refer to section 5.27 for further detail.
4. The “persons charged” category includes the number of people charged or recommended for charges by police according to the most serious offence. Please refer to section 5.28 of this report for more detail. Please note that all persons charged with traffic offences are grouped under “adults charged” as information on age for this offence is not available.
5. Homicide investigations undertaken by the Missing Women’s Task Force in Port Coquitlam, B.C. resulted in 15 homicides being reported by the police in 2002 and a further 6 in 2003. Homicide counts reflect the year in which police file the report.
6. The data collected by the UCR Survey counts the number of criminal fraud incidents in Canada. The UCR Survey does not take into account the number of times a single stolen credit or debit card may be used, or the number of cheques a person could pass at a time. If a single credit card is fraudulently used a number of times by the same person, it will be counted as only one incident of fraud. Information regarding multiple occurrences of fraud within one incident is collected only from those respondents reporting to the Incident-based Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR2) Survey. Data from the UCR2 survey indicate that, on average, the same person will pass 1.9 fraudulent cheques in a single store in the course of one day, or during a single incident. A single credit/debit card will be fraudulently used an average of 2.3 times before being discarded or confiscated by the police. “Other frauds” are perpetrated an average of 1.6 times by the same person over a period of time. When these multiple occurrences are taken into account, the 92,838 fraud incidents represent more than 168,000 actual fraudulent uses of debit/credit cards and cheques reported to police. It should be noted that many frauds are not reported to the police.

## CHAPTER 4

### Data quality

#### 4.1 Authority

The authority to collect UCR statistics is provided under the *Statistics Act*, Revised Statutes of Canada, 1985, Chapter S19.

#### 4.2 Confidentiality

Statistics Canada is prohibited by law from publishing any statistics which would divulge information obtained from the UCR Survey that relates to any identifiable respondent or individual without their previous written consent. The information reported is treated in confidence, used for statistical purposes, and published in aggregate form only. The confidentiality provisions of the *Statistics Act* are not affected by the *Access to Information Act* or any other legislation.

#### 4.3 Uses of the data

Data from the UCR Survey provide key information for crime analysis, resource planning and program development for the policing community. Municipal and provincial governments use the data to aid decisions about the distribution of police resources, definitions of provincial standards and for comparisons with other departments and provinces. The survey data inform on policy and legislative development, evaluation of new legislative initiatives, and international comparisons. To the public, the survey offers information on the nature and extent of police-reported crime and crime trends in Canada. The media, academics and researchers use these data to examine specific issues about crime.

#### 4.4 Coverage

There are approximately 1,200 separate police locations responding to the survey, comprising about 220 different police forces. Aggregate and incident-based UCR data are handled, processed, and stored in separate operational systems. In order to maintain historical continuity with the aggregate survey as well as comparability across police forces during implementation, detailed data obtained from the incident-based survey are tabulated into counts consistent with those of the aggregate survey. During production of the annual crime data, data from the aggregate UCR Survey and aggregated data from the Incident-based UCR Survey are combined to create national statistics.

##### Aggregate UCR Survey

The aggregate UCR Survey has produced a continuous historical record of crime data since 1962. Coverage in terms of police respondents complying with the aggregate UCR Survey is 99.9%. The most significant loss of information occurs in the rare situation where a police force is unable to submit data to the CCJS. In this situation, estimates are calculated for that particular force.

##### Incident-based UCR2 Survey

Due to its phased implementation, the degree of coverage for the Incident-based UCR2 Survey is in constant flux. In 2003, the Incident-based UCR2 Survey had 122 police forces reporting to it, representing about 61% of the national volume of reported crime. The reader is cautioned that the incident-based UCR2 data are not representative of any particular region in Canada: 41% of the incidents are currently from Ontario, 30% from Quebec, 11% from Alberta, 5% from British Columbia, 5% from Manitoba, 5% from Saskatchewan, 2% from Nova Scotia, 1% from New Brunswick and 1% from Newfoundland and Labrador. This data set, with the exception of Quebec and Ontario, is composed primarily of urban police departments. The data are not nationally or regionally representative.

#### 4.5 Data capture and editing

##### Aggregate UCR Survey

Data for the aggregate survey are sent to the CCJS on survey forms or in machine-readable format. Monthly counts of aggregate crime and traffic incidents are recorded by police agencies and forwarded to the CCJS approximately two weeks after month-end. These forms are visually edited for completeness and consistency and, if necessary, follow-up telephone calls are made to the respondent for clarification and correction. The crime and traffic data are transferred to an electronic format

and all counts are verified to ensure that the information has been captured correctly. Machine-readable files are transferred to the mainframe environment. Some respondents submit their counts in machine-readable format, such as on tape, which eliminates the initial processing procedures.

The raw data are processed through a set of automated edit routines to further verify the counts for internal consistency. Error reports are produced and respondents are contacted to obtain correct information. Corrections are re-submitted for verification and updates. Master files of aggregate data are continually updated throughout the year and are further processed to produce the year-end data.

Police departments are required to revise submitted information if additional information becomes available (e.g., an accused has been charged for a previously reported incident) to ensure the UCR counts processed by the CCJS will correspond with the records maintained by police departments at year-end.

#### **Incident-based UCR2 Survey**

Data for the Incident-based Survey are collected from police automated operational systems by an approved extraction program and are forwarded to the CCJS in a machine-readable format with a standard record layout. Data are generally submitted to the CCJS on a monthly basis.

Upon receipt of the data by the CCJS, initial data quality procedures are applied to verify basic format and physical record integrity and the data are prepared for processing. A central processing system performs a series of intensive edits (more than 300) on these data, including duplicate record checks, logic and format error edits and imputations. The system does not allow for errors on key variables; they will not pass the edits until they have been corrected. The outcome of the edits and imputations is documented in a series of edit reports and all processed data are stored in a database. Edit reports summarize the number and types of records processed, a frequency count of edit failures and a listing of every record which failed an edit. All edits are examined at the CCJS with the objective of identifying possible problems with the respondent system interface or with respondent adherence to survey data requirements. Any problems are followed up with the respondent. Edit reports are also sent to the respondents for their information and for data correction.

#### **4.6 Data compilation and verification**

The data capture and correction processes of both UCR surveys are ongoing activities. At present, the final counts are published in July. This release follows a lengthy data production cycle which begins in September of the previous year with the preparation of interim consolidated statistics. Preliminary statistics are prepared to provide an early warning of any data reporting problems. Problems are identified with the use of a statistical "tolerance" model specifically designed to compare a single respondent to its past behaviour and to that of similar respondents.

Non-respondents are identified using this model, and staff follow-up to collect outstanding monthly counts. Respondents not submitting counts for 6 months or more are referred to as "non-respondents". A closure of a police service or seasonal operation may explain an anomaly in the data. The larger police departments responding to the UCR surveys are asked to review summary data tables for completeness and accuracy and, if necessary, adjustments are made before a master file is created. In order to create either the preliminary or final master file, the incident-based file must be converted to produce counts comparable to those produced by the aggregate survey. The converted counts referred to as the "Derived Aggregate Offence" data, are combined with the aggregate survey data to produce the national and provincial tables displayed in this publication. In this way, continuity is maintained with the historical crime series.

#### **4.7 Quality of the data**

The CCJS follows several different practices to ensure the quality of UCR data. The internal integrity of records received from respondents and the reasonableness of a respondent's counts are continually assessed through both manual and electronic editing of the data (see section 4.5 for a description of the editing processes). Where possible, UCR data are checked against independently produced respondent crime statistics such as police annual reports. Respondents are also provided toll-free telephone support to assist with any survey-related issues. Training is provided to new respondents and all respondents are provided with comprehensive user manuals which provide rules on survey scoring. The CCJS does not, however, normally audit respondent data.

As the aggregate and incident-based surveys operate in a significantly different manner, specific issues surrounding data quality and the procedures required to ensure it are different.

### Aggregate UCR Survey

The aggregate master files are continually updated throughout the year, and are further processed when necessary to produce consolidated aggregate statistics. Errors identified during the editing of the data are pursued with the respondent where necessary and corrected. As the data reported to the aggregate survey are provided in the form of summary counts, problems related to counting and scoring are difficult to assess. In this regard, extensive survey support to respondents through user guides, telephone support and training is crucial to maintaining data quality.

### Incident-based UCR2 Survey

The Incident-based UCR Survey captures a broad variety of data on each criminal incident. Data from this survey also undergo extensive editing during the data capture process at the CCJS. Unlike aggregate data where editing can only identify missing data and ensure that values tabulate correctly, incident-based data are subjected to more detailed validity and logic checks which assess each respondent's compliance with survey data requirements and ensure that only records which conform to these requirements are available for analysis. Consequently, in addition to being able to assess the overall counts of incidents, the quality of data associated with each incident can be evaluated in greater detail. As more police agencies begin to participate in the Incident-based UCR2 Survey, the data provide an increasingly more accurate picture of the nature of incidents reported to police in Canada.

Specific areas of concern with respect to data quality include: the variety of software interfaces used to extract incident-based UCR2 data; the complexity of operational data capture and extraction and variety of operational and administrative practices among different police forces.

It should be noted that Toronto Police implemented a new records management system in September 2003. As the transition had a short-term impact on data quality, Toronto data for September to December 2003 were estimated based on 2002 data for the same period.

During the production of each year's crime statistics, data from the previous year are revised to reflect any updates or changes that have been received from the police services.

#### 4.7.1 Note on data quality: reporting changes to Ontario data

During the revision of the 2001 data for the province of Ontario, a discrepancy was detected in the methodology applied by the forces in the province using the Ontario Municipal & Provincial Police Automated Co-operative (OMPPAC) system. These forces report approximately one-third of the total criminal incidents for the province and include the OPP and about 40 small and mid-sized municipal forces. This discrepancy resulted in an over-count of less serious criminal incidents in cases where more than one offence type was associated within the same incident. The net effect was an over-count of the total number of criminal incidents in Ontario for 2001 by about 4%. At the national level, this produced an over-count of criminal incidents of approximately 1%. Comparisons of Ontario data for 2001, 2002 and 2003 data to earlier years should be made with caution as further analysis of the impact on the Ontario time series prior to 2001 has not yet been completed.

### 4.8 Under-reporting crime

The UCR Survey collects information on only those crimes which come to the attention of the police and are reported by police to the survey. The UCR data, therefore, do not contain a count of all crimes in Canada: some crimes are never detected and, of those that are, some are never brought to the attention of the police. Furthermore, the **most serious offence** (see section 5.25) scoring rule produces an under-count of the number of crimes coming to the attention of police. The UCR crime statistics represent a subset of all crimes occurring in Canada, but are an accurate measure of the number of criminal incidents being reported to the police.

The CCJS does not routinely undertake audits of a police department's Records Unit to ensure complete and accurate reporting. Nor does the CCJS examine records which the police have processed and described as outside the scope of the survey. Police departments, however, have established rules governing the collection of data (coding manuals) and have designated individuals with the task of verifying the reports from which the data are extracted. Local quality control measures are in effect for respondents of the aggregate and the incident-based survey to minimize under-reporting.

## 4.9 Inter-municipal comparisons

Data users should consider a number of factors when comparing crime data from various municipal police forces. Differences across municipalities in their crime data can be attributed to factors such as demographic and economic differences, and police force and community characteristics. Inter-municipal differences in police policies or resources and historical changes in enforcement practices of police may contribute to variations in reported statistics. Statistics for certain crimes (e.g., prostitution, gambling, drug crime and traffic offences) are particularly sensitive to changes in policing practices.

In this report, the CMA boundaries have been modified slightly in order to more accurately reflect policing boundaries. The areas that police forces serve may differ in their mix of urban/suburban populations, making the comparability of crime rates among these forces difficult. This lack of comparability is addressed by analyzing crime rates by CMA. Usually, more than one police force is responsible for enforcing the law within the boundaries of a single census metropolitan area.

## 4.10 Comparability over time

### Legislative Influences

Changes in legislation and the resulting change in the offence classification creates discontinuity in the historical record of particular criminal offences. Legislative changes to assault, sexual assault, theft, arson, mischief, prostitution and youth crime must be considered when making comparisons over time. Some of the more significant changes are as follows:

#### Sexual Assault: Bill C-127 (1983):

Bill C-127 abolished the offences of rape, attempted rape and indecent assault and introduced a three-tiered structure for sexual assault offences. The Bill also eased the circumstances under which police could lay charges in incidents of sexual and non-sexual assault.

#### Young Offenders Act (1984):

With the proclamation of the YOA in April 1984, 12 years became the minimum age for which criminal charges could be laid. However, the maximum age continued to vary until April 1985, when the maximum age of 17 (up to the 18th birthday) was established in all provinces and territories.

Youths, as defined in this publication, refer to those aged 12 to 17 (inclusive). This definition applies to the target group who fall under the delegation of the *Young Offenders Act (YOA)*.

#### Dangerous and Impaired Operation: Bill C-18 (1985):

Bill C-18 imposed more stringent sentences for dangerous driving and drinking and driving. It also facilitated the enforcement of impaired driving laws by authorizing police to take blood and/or breath samples under certain circumstances.

#### Property value limits: Bill C-18 (1985) and Bill C-42 (1995):

In 1985, Bill C-18 altered the property value limits from under and over \$200 to under and over \$1,000. This applies to offences such as theft, possession of stolen goods, mischief and fraud.

As of February 1995, Bill C-42 revised the property value limits to under and over \$5,000.

#### Alternative measures: Bill C-41 (1996):

Bill C-41 was proclaimed into law September 3, 1996. One of its highlights was the introduction of "alternative measures" for adults, which provided ways of dealing with disputes and minor offences outside the formal court proceedings.

#### Firearms: Bill C-68 (1997):

Bill C-68, proclaimed on January 1, 1997, requires that all firearm owners must obtain a Firearms Licence. This licence replaces the Firearms Acquisition Certificate in use since 1977. Commencing October 1, 1998, each weapon must be registered within five years and a Registration Certificate will be issued. Bill C-68 also provides for tougher penalties for using a firearm while committing a crime.

#### Controlled Drugs and Substances Act: Bill C-8 (1997):

This new legislation came into force on May 14, 1997. This new legislation repeals and replaces the *Narcotic Control Act* and Parts III and IV of the *Food and Drugs Act*.

Youth Criminal Justice Act: Bill C-7 (2003):

Youths aged 12 to 17 who come into contact with the law can be formally charged or dealt with by other means. While this has always been true, the Youth Criminal Justice Act, which came into force on April 1, 2003 replacing the Young Offenders Act, requires that police consider the use of extrajudicial (non-court) measures for less serious offences. The extrajudicial measures encouraged by the *Youth Criminal Justice Act* include taking no further action, informal police warnings, referrals to community programs, formal police cautions, Crown cautions and extrajudicial sanctions programs. It is presumed that extrajudicial measures are adequate to hold accountable non-violent offenders who have not previously been found guilty in court. It is essential to take into account both youths formally charged by police and youths "cleared otherwise" in measuring youth criminal activity coming to the attention of police. This will present trends for youths charged, youths "cleared otherwise", and the crime rate resulting from the combined counts.

Proposed Legislation to Decriminalize the Possession of Small Quantities of Cannabis:

In May 2003, a Bill was introduced into Parliament which proposed the decriminalization of possessing small quantities of cannabis, held for personal use, and introduced fines. The Bill was not passed before Parliament ended its session. In the face of uncertainty about the eventual outcome of proposed amendments, many police services have continued to count incidents of, but stopped laying charges for possession of small amounts of cannabis.

**Comparing UCR data with courts and corrections data**

It is difficult to make comparisons between data reported by police and data from other sectors of the criminal justice system (i.e., courts and corrections). There is no single unit of count (i.e., incidents, offences, charges, cases or persons) which is defined consistently across the major sectors of the justice system. As well, charges actually laid can be different from the **most serious offence** by which incidents are categorized. In addition, the number and type of charges laid by police may change at the pre-court stage or during the court process. Time lags between the various stages of the justice process also make comparisons difficult.

## CHAPTER 5

### Concepts and definitions

#### 5.1 Incident

The "**incident**" is the basis for counting reported crime in both UCR Surveys. An incident is the set of connected events usually constituting an occurrence report. In the aggregate survey, the incident is used in conjunction with the most serious offence (MSO) rule (see section 5.25) to form the aggregate offence counts. In the incident-based survey, information for each incident is reported individually. Aggregate most serious offence rules are then applied to these data in order to reconcile them with historical aggregate counts as well as with data from aggregate respondents (see section 4.6 on data compilation and verification). The **incident "date"** is based on the date the incident became known to the police, as opposed to the date on which the incident occurred.

#### 5.2 Aggregate UCR Survey

In UCR terminology, **Aggregate UCR** has two meanings. It can represent both the aggregate survey instrument itself as well as the aggregate *form* of UCR data (thus including incident-based UCR data which have been compiled into aggregate counts). The aggregate UCR concepts and definitions described below apply equally to both. In this report, aggregate UCR statistics are presented in tables 2.1 to 2.4.

- 5.21 Violent incidents** involve offences that deal with the application, or threat of application, of force to a person. These include homicide, attempted murder, various forms of sexual and non-sexual assault, robbery and abduction. Traffic incidents that result in death or bodily harm are included under *Criminal Code* traffic incidents.
- 5.22 Property incidents** involve unlawful acts with the intent of gaining property but do not involve the use or threat of violence against an individual. Theft, breaking and entering, fraud and possession of stolen goods are examples of property crimes.
- 5.23 Other *Criminal Code* incidents** involve the remaining *Criminal Code* offences that are not classified as violent or property incidents (excluding traffic). Examples are mischief, bail violations, disturbing the peace, arson, counterfeiting, prostitution and offensive weapons.
- 5.24 Total *Criminal Code* incidents** is the tabulation of all violent, property and other *Criminal Code* incidents reported in a given year.
- 5.25 Most serious offence** The UCR Survey classifies incidents according to the **most serious offence (MSO)** in the incident. In categorizing incidents, violent offences always take precedence over non-violent offences. Within violent and non-violent, offences are then sorted according to the maximum sentence under the *Criminal Code*. The UCR Survey scores violent incidents differently from other types of crime. For violent crimes, a separate incident is recorded for each victim (categorized according to the *most serious offence* against the victim). If, for example, one person assaults three people, then three incidents are recorded. If three people assault one person, only one incident is recorded. For non-violent crimes, one incident (categorized according to the *most serious offence* in the incident) is counted for every distinct or separate occurrence.

Robbery is one exception to the above scoring rule. Robbery is categorized as a violent offence. Unlike all other violent offences, one occurrence of robbery is equal to one incident, regardless of the number of victims. The reason for this exception is that robbery can involve many people who could all be considered victims. In a bank robbery with 5 tellers and 20 customers present, 25 incidents of robbery would be counted if the normal scoring rule for violent incidents were applied. This would seriously overstate the occurrence of robbery.

Thus, the total number of incidents recorded by the UCR Survey is not a census of all violations of the law that come to the attention of police. Rather, it is equal to the number of victims of violent crimes (other than robberies) plus the number of separate occurrences of non-violent crimes (and robberies).

- 5.26 Actual incidents** When a crime is reported to the police, the incident is recorded as a "reported" incident. Police conduct a preliminary investigation to determine the validity of the report. Occasionally, crimes reported to the police prove to be unfounded. Unfounded incidents are subtracted from the number of reported incidents to produce the

number of "actual incidents." Numbers and rates of crime are calculated on the basis of "actual incidents" categorized according to the **most serious offence**.

**5.27 Clearance of actual incidents** Criminal incidents can either be cleared "by charge" or "cleared otherwise". When a police investigation leads to the identification of a suspect, an "information" is laid against that person (i.e., the person is formally charged). From a statistical point of view, the laying of an information means that at least one actual incident can be "cleared by charge".

Incidents can also be "cleared otherwise." In some cases, police cannot lay an information even if they have identified a suspect and have enough evidence to support the laying of an information. Examples include cases of diplomatic immunity, instances where the complainant declines to proceed with charges against the accused, or cases where the alleged offender dies before he or she can be formally charged. Such incidents are considered to be "cleared otherwise," that is, other than by the laying of a charge.

Since the process of solving crime is often time-consuming, a criminal incident may be solved months or even years after it was reported to police and recorded on the UCR Survey. Therefore, on the aggregate UCR database, there is no direct relationship between the number of "actual incidents" and the number of "incidents cleared." This is why it is possible for the number of incidents cleared to be greater than the total number of actual incidents. Although total incidents are not necessarily linked with those incidents that are cleared, a clearance rate may provide a good indication of the proportion of incidents that are cleared by charge or otherwise for different types of offences.

Some types of procedural differences influence the comparability of municipal or provincial data. Specifically, the survey element "clearance status" is interpreted differently in several provinces compared to other jurisdictions. In New Brunswick and Quebec (for the Sûreté du Québec only), the initial clearance status recommended by the police (e.g., cleared by a specific charge) is subject to approval by the Crown. Should the Crown find insufficient evidence to proceed with the charge, the police revise their records to take into account the recommendation of the Crown. According to the data element definition, a charge is cleared only if there is sufficient evidence to proceed. However, other jurisdictions, including British Columbia which has a system similar to Quebec, do not revise their internal records when the Crown disagrees with the police assessment of the evidence. For this reason, caution should be taken in making comparisons between jurisdictions for this data element.

**5.28 Persons charged** The UCR Survey also records the number of persons charged. For incidents that are cleared, the survey collects the number of adults charged by sex as well as the number of youths (aged 12 to 17 years) charged by sex. The "persons charged" category includes the number of people charged (not the number of charges laid) or recommended for charges by police. A person who is simultaneously charged with more than one offence is counted according to the *most serious offence*, even if the offences occurred in more than one incident. In addition, persons may be counted more than once throughout the year; that is, individuals are counted on each occasion that they are charged by police.

"Persons charged" refers to persons who were charged in connection with a particular incident. These persons, however, may have been charged later with a lesser offence. For example, a person who commits a breaking and entering offence may end up being charged with possession of stolen goods if, for instance, the police have better evidence on the latter offence. Both the "actual incident" and the "person charged" are counted under breaking and entering, even though the person was actually charged with possession of stolen goods.

### 5.3 Incident-based UCR2 Survey

**5.31 Violations** The Incident-based UCR2 Survey employs a more detailed set of offence categories compared to the aggregate UCR. Any attempt to match the aggregate UCR sub-totals of Violent, Property and Other *Criminal Code* Offences with the incident-based sub-totals is not advised as the two subsets are comprised of different offence categories. For example, the incident-based sub-total of Violations Against the Person includes additional offences (e.g. criminal negligence causing death/causing bodily harm, other related offences causing death, conspire to commit murder, kidnapping, hostage taking, extortion, criminal harassment and other violent violations).

There are six types of violations included in the category of **Violations against Property**: break and enter, theft, arson, possession of stolen goods, fraud and mischief. Once again, two additional offences of arson and mischief are included in this sub-grouping yet are not amongst the components making up "Total Property" offences under the aggregate UCR. Similarly, **Other Criminal Code Violations** within the Incident-based UCR2 Survey includes the additional offence categories of firearm transfers/serial numbers and threatening/harassing phone calls which are not reported separately within the aggregate survey.

Although incident-based survey respondents can code up to four violations on an incident, for reporting purposes, tables 3.2 - 3.20 in this report are based on the most serious offence rule (see section 5.25 for a description of this rule) and include only actual incidents (see section 5.26).

### **Persons data**

A key aspect of the incident-based UCR survey is the capture of accused and victim information which is directly linked to the incident.

- 5.32 Charged/suspect-chargeable (accused)** Refers to any person who has been identified by police as being involved in a criminal incident and against whom an information could be laid as a result of sufficient evidence/information. Accused persons include those charged as well as those not charged for a variety of reasons, including diplomatic immunity, use of alternative measures or diversion, and death. Individuals involved only for investigative purposes and subsequently released without being charged or formally processed in some other official manner will not be identified as an accused. Unless otherwise noted, the accused counts and offence characteristics described in the tables in Chapter 3 are based on each accused identified with **each** incident, not the most serious offence a person is charged with at a given time as in the aggregate method (see section 5.28). The new Youth Criminal Justice Act measures wouldn't apply to the aggregate survey.
- 5.33 Victim** Refers to anyone who is the victim of a violation against the person (as defined by the Incident-based UCR2 Survey). These include all violent violations and any traffic violations that cause bodily harm or death to anyone other than the accused. Persons who are the victim of other types of incidents of crime are not captured. Victimization counts reported in Chapter 3 include each victim. There may be more than one victim in an incident. The categorization of violation type is, as with aggregate UCR, based on the most serious violation against that victim (see most serious offence rule, section 5.25).
